## **County Health Department Leads STOP THE BLEED Training Teaches New York State Association of County Health Officials Staff**

(**Albany, NY**)-- Staff from the New York State Association of County Health Officials (NYSACHO) recently took part in a STOP THE BLEED training program led by the Montgomery County Health Department.

STOP THE BLEED is an international program initiated by a federal interagency workgroup. The program partners with numerous government, not-for-profit and commercial organizations to save lives by raising awareness of basic actions to stop life threatening bleeding following everyday emergencies and man-made and natural disasters.

Advances made by military medicine and research in hemorrhage control during the wars in Afghanistan and Iraq have informed the work of this initiative which exemplifies translation of knowledge back to the homeland to the benefit of the general public.
